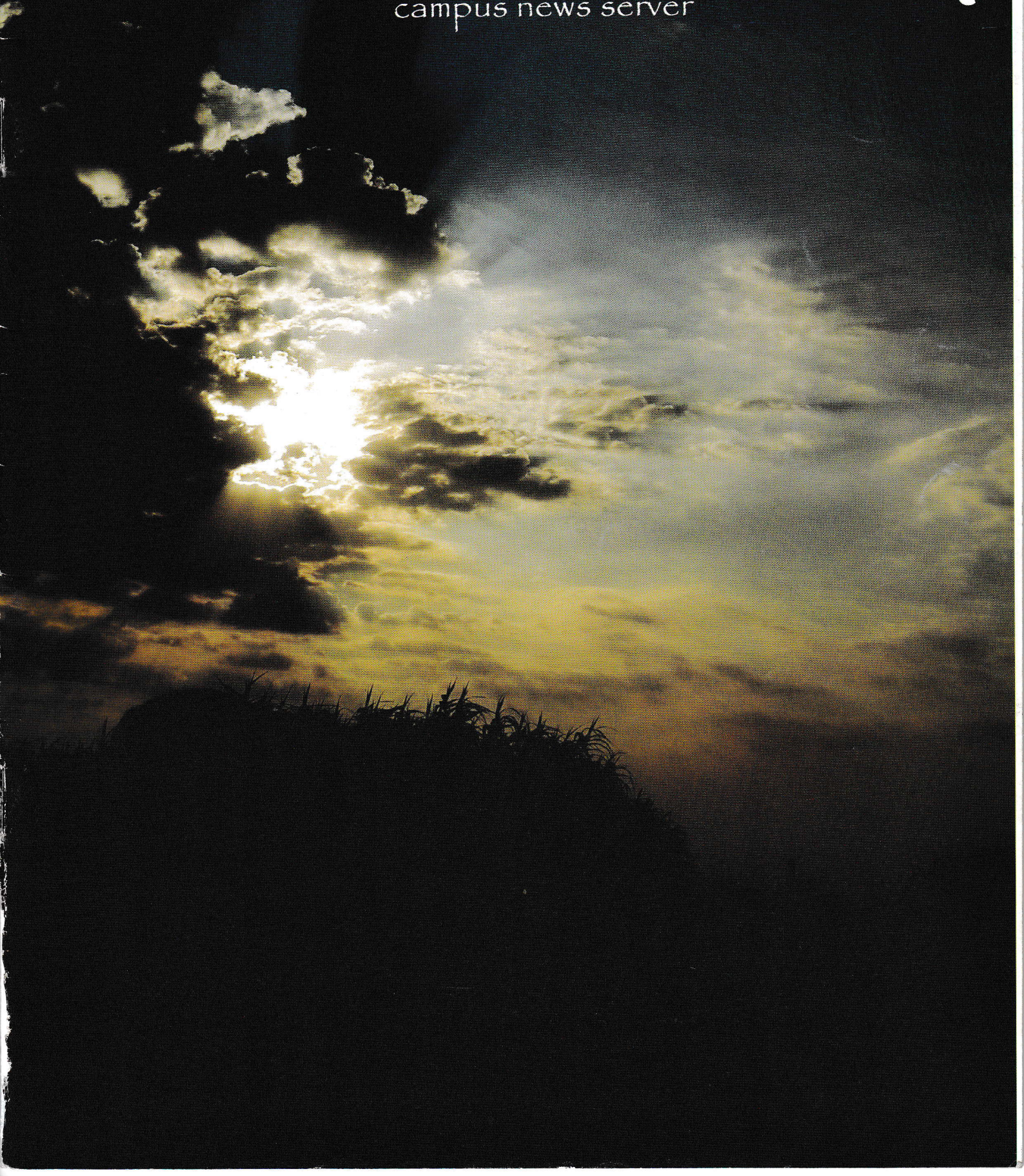

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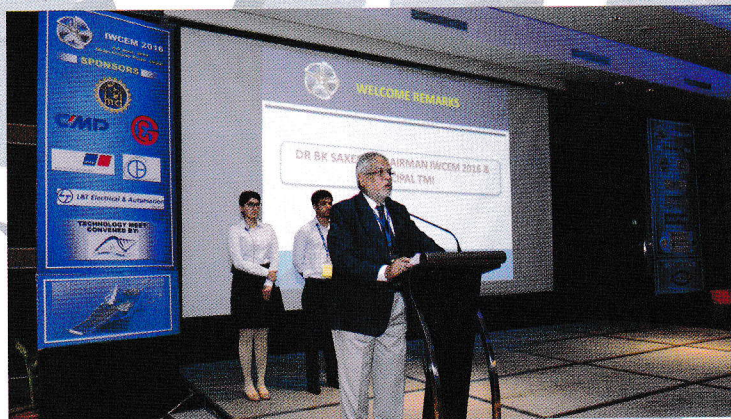

IWCEM 2016

For the year of 2016, the 9th IWCEM was held at Crowne Plaza, Jaipur from 4th to 6th June, 2016. 225 people participated in the conference. The chief guest for IWCEM was Defense secretary- Shri G. Mohan Kumar. In the Inaugural session, Dr. B.K. Saxena – Chairman, IWCEM greeted the chief guest. Chief Guest also enlightened the audience with his words. Further that day, four Key note sessions took place along with Technology meet and Conference Technical sessions. On day two, there were two parallel sessions continued from the previous day, and for the second half, an additional Workshop on Nano-structured marine coatings was also conducted. MARITIME INDIA SUMMIT

Maritime India summit (MIS 2016) marked India's first ever Maritime Summit, and was inaugurated by Prime Minister Mr. Narendra Modi on 14th April 2016 in Goregaon, Mumbai. This event comprised of a two day conference and a three day exhibition held between 14th April and 16th April. This first of its kind summit was a unique global platform aimed at exploring new opportunities by attracting potential global investors from the maritime sectors. The conference had special sessions on investment opportunities in Maritime Sector with focus on ship building, ship repair, ship recycling, dredger/barge manufacturing, setting up of new ports and capacity augmentation of existing ports, development of inland waterways for cargo and passenger transportation, coastal shipping, passenger ferry services, lighthouse and cruise tourism, island development and aquatic resources, maritime cluster development and other services related to Indian Maritime Sector.

The Institute was represented by a contingent of 25, 19 and 13 people on 14th, 15th and 16th of April respectively with Cdt Kamal Yadav heading the delegation. Cadets experienced commercial and political aspect of the maritime sector and attended talks by stakeholders, business house representatives, port officials etc.

The summit was also attended by Shri Nitin Gadkari (Union Minister of Shipping, Road Transport & Highways) and Shri P. Radhakrishnan (Minister of State for Shipping, Road Transport & Highways). The Prime Minister gave a speech highlighting the importance and potential that the maritime sector possesses. He threw light on the goals for the industry and announced his intention to mobilise investment worth one lakh crore. Republic of Korea was the partner country.

MARINE INSURANCE CONFERENCE

First All India Annual Conference on Risk and Marine Insurance held at Tolani Maritime Institute, Induri, on 19th December, 2015. It was jointly organized by Tolani Maritime Institute and National Insurance Academy (NIA). The theme for the 2015 conference was Confluence of Maritime & Insurance Sector. The conference was sponsored by National Insurance Company. National Insurance Academy is a premier institution developed to equip the Insurance industry with the best of talents. Its close association with the Insurance industry provides the real life reference to its training, education, research and consultancy activities. NIA conducts Management Development Programs catering to the needs of insurance industry professionals to enhance their management skills and domain expertise.

A Guard of Honour was presented to the Chief Guest - Mr. John Pulinthanam, General Manager of National Insurance Company - by TMI Cadets. The conference started with invocation of Goddess Saraswati, lighting of the lamp and release of conference CD. Mr. S. K. Srivastava, Convener, Faculty TMI introduced the objectives, themes and sub themes of the conference to the audience. Dr. B K Saxena, Chairman, Principal TMI welcomed the Chief Guest, speakers and delegates.

In his inaugural address, Chief Guest Mr. John Pulinthanam appreciated the idea of the coming together of two academic institutions to bring awareness about marine risk and insurance. He spoke on the challenges faced by maritime sector and the importance of general insurance in conditions of catastrophe.

Mr. P C James - Co-Chairman, NIA, proposed Vote of Thanks. He explained about the importance of such conferences and wished that TMI and NIA will cooperate further in the field of Marine Insurance.

The first keynote address was by Capt. Kapil Dev Bahl, Director, Murray Fenton, India. He spoke on P & I Insurance. His presentation included liability, structure and functioning of P&I clubs, claims handling, loss minimization, freight demurrage and defense. He presented case studies on crew death, explosion and shore crane damage by ship. The second keynote address was by Mr. Ashok M. Gawarikar, Proprietor, Transocean Marine & General Survey Agencies. His presentation was on documentary frauds, scuttling of ship, skillful cargo thefts from containers. He presented a number of case studies of fraud and theft of cargo. The third keynote address was by Capt. Subhash Deshpande, faculty TMI. He delivered a presentation on machinery insurance & impact of ISM code. His presentation included risk management, human element and the ISM code. He dealt with many case studies to link elements of ISM code with marine insurance.

Sometimes I just sit back and play our performance videos closing my eyes just to hear the crowd cheering, it gives me immense pleasure.

What are the challenges you faced? Setbacks?

PP: The biggest challenge we face is setting up practice sessions for all our participants, the constraints being time, a tight schedule and hostel restrictions. These reasons are a severe hindrance to our practice and performance and often lead to tension within the group itself.

What goes through the mind of each person before getting on stage? Emotions like fear, excitement?

To be very Frank everyone is very very afraid and nervous. I take a part of the blame because I'm a very tough taskmaster, I very rarely (read-never) praise any of my members. I'm a constant critic to my team. So it's only human that most of them are very scared. But it is this balance of fear and excitement which makes an artist click on stage. After a point of time when the fear is gone, all you have is excitement and loads of energy. Ultimately, these are the things that pull you through at the end moments of your act when ur energy levels are really low.

Last but not least, your message to your faithful audience.

The beautiful part about our audience is that it includes everyone from our faculty team to our friends to our beloved security guards to our 'mamas'.

Frankly speaking, the task of keeping so many people laughing with the same joke is a very difficult task. Yet it is one task that my team loves to do. 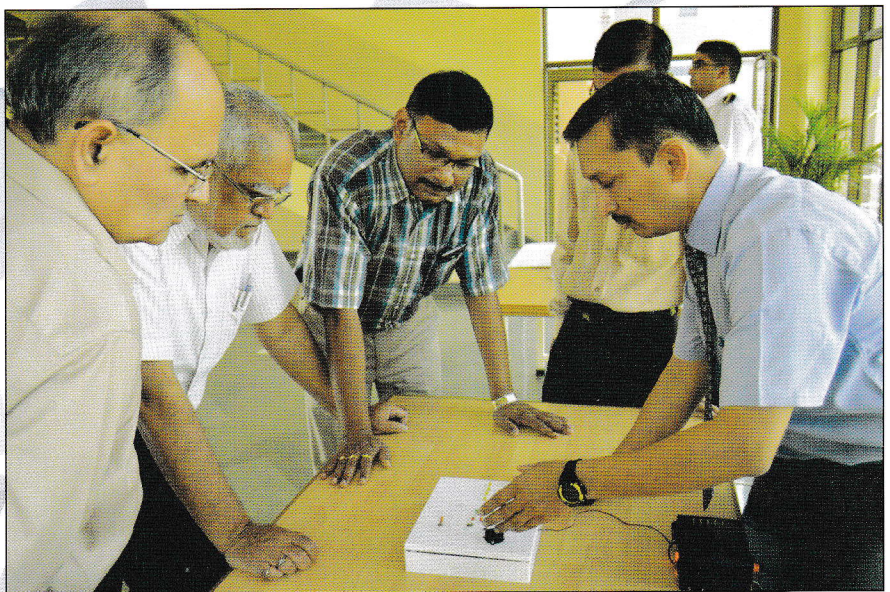
GENUINO DAY

ALUMNI SPEAK - NAMAN UPADHYAY

Q1. How does it feel to have done so well in such a competitive exam? Are you satisfied with your results?

It feels great. Yes, I am pretty much satisfied. It reinforces my belief that hard work and patience always pay off.

Q2. How has your life Post TMI been?

Life has been very different and somewhat tough. As it took almost a year to recover from an accident on board ship and then again getting back to books, experiencing failures. But I think the things I learned during my graduation in TMI helped me a lot to tackle the situations and take important decisions.

Q3. How has TMI helped you in your achievements?

TMI has helped me a lot and played a crucial role in achieving my goal. The things I have learnt during my stay at TMI have helped me to sustain the pressure and keep moving towards my goal. Many people usually leave the preparation of this exam after one or two attempts. But I could continue with my preparation due to the training in TMI. This exam is not a 100 m dash but a Marathon (Cross Country for better understanding J) and it requires patience, discipline, and perseverance. And TMI has instilled many of these qualities in me.

Q4. Tell us of an incident in TMI that you will always remember.

There are plenty of things which I'll always remember. But two things I'll never forget -

1. It was during our time that NEW HOSTEL was established and Mudaliar and master house were shifted to the new hostel. So there was hue and cry about this.

2. It was our batch of 2004 which, for the first time, organized METTLE 2008 - TMI's first inter-college fest. And we all participated in it and made it a huge success.

And definitely I can't forget the morning P.T. muster. It was only after my passing out from TMI that I realized how helpful it was.

Q5. What made you choose Merchant Navy and TMI?

My maternal uncle was into merchant navy and I admired him a lot. After seeing him and listening to his experiences, I found his profession quiet interesting and thus I was attracted towards it. I chose TMI because of its reputation, course curricula and excellent placements.

Q6. What are your future plans?

I want to pursue Foreign Services, and enrich my knowledge in International Relations/Diplomacy by doing a course from Oxford. And simultaneously, I want to play a crucial role in advancing India's national interests abroad and ensuring domestic transformation through my skills in diplomacy.

Q7. What do you think distinguishes TMI from the other colleges?

I think two most prominent things of TMI which distinguish it from other colleges are

1. Excellent and committed faculty members who are always ready to help. (I still remember that Saxena Sir, Razdan Sir, Basu Sir, Dasgupta Sir, Kanungo Sir and all the other faculty members of TMI were accessible all the time and ready to guide us.)

2. State of the art infrastructure which gives students hands on experience on the latest technology and thus equipping them to perform well on board ship. (When I was studying at TMI, the 2G, 4G, 6G welding courses certified by Llyods were conducted in our own workshop.)

Apart from this, TMI has always striven for excellence and it has evolved itself to meet the industry requirement. There is a unique Academic and Industry interface in TMI which is lacking in most of the colleges/universities in India.

Q8. A word of advice for the TMI cadets.

Never ever get disheartened/demotivated. Always remain optimistic and hopeful. Even when you are not placed initially in few companies. I know when the placement season starts, it is the time when most of us are under serious pressure. Especially the students in the range of 6-7 CGPA. I was among the last few people to get placed (with a CGPA of about 8). Always remain confident and hopeful and don't get depressed. Honest hard work and dedication always pays off. Life is much greater than marks. Enjoy your stay in TMI and try to learn and inculcate as many things as possible. Believe me, you'll miss these days once you leave college (and I am serious...you'll miss morning PT muster too). And the things you learn at TMI will not only help you in sailing but in any field you venture into in life. Try to apply the things you learn here in your actual life. Finally, I would like to mention a quote which my father told me when I was not able to clear UPSC in my last attempt -

“Abhi Mujhe Aur Dheeme Kadam Rakhna Hai, Abhi Toh Chalne Ki Awaaz Aati Hai”. Which means - you should always be ready to accept your mistakes, learn from them and improve upon them. There is always scope for improvement.

FERRY DESIGN COMPETITION

The World Ferry Safety Association(WFSA), NYC conducted an International Student Ferry Design Competition, focusing on primary safety and work ability of ferries in selected waterways throughout the world. 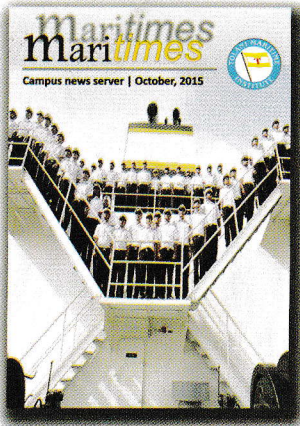

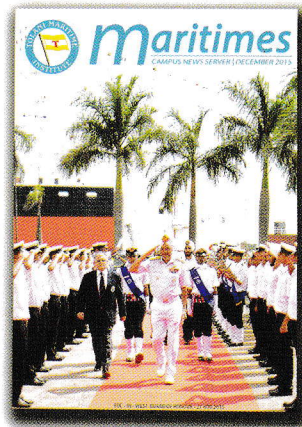
