EDITOR SPEAKS

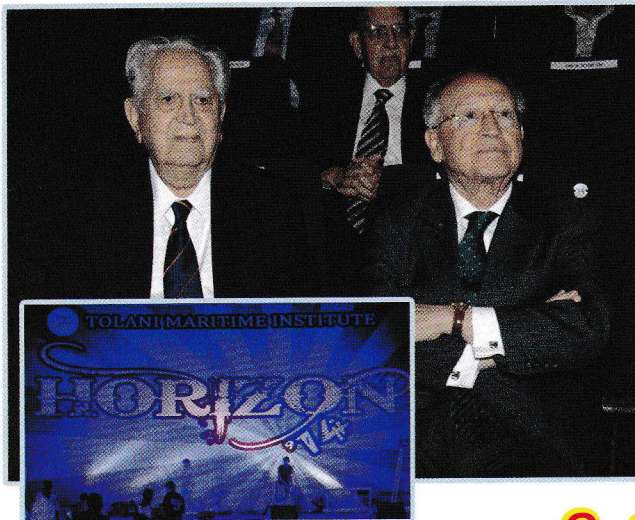

Dr. C P Srivastava Memorial Lecture

To commemorate the outstanding contribution of Dr. C P Srivastava to the global shipping and to Tolani Maritime Institute (TMI) in its formative years, TMI hosted the inaugural Dr. C P Srivastava Memorial Lecture on the 8th of July, 2014, at Y B Chavan Pratishtham Auditorium, Mumbai. Dr C P Srivastava was the secretary to India's former Prime Minister Lal Bahadur Shastri. He served the International Maritime Organization for 16 long years as Secretary-General and later as Secretary-General Emeritus. He received the Padma Vibhushan from the President of India, KCMG from the Queen of England and about 40 other international awards and honours. The event was attended by eminent personalities from the shipping industry and the family members of Dr C P Srivastava, who passed away in 2013.



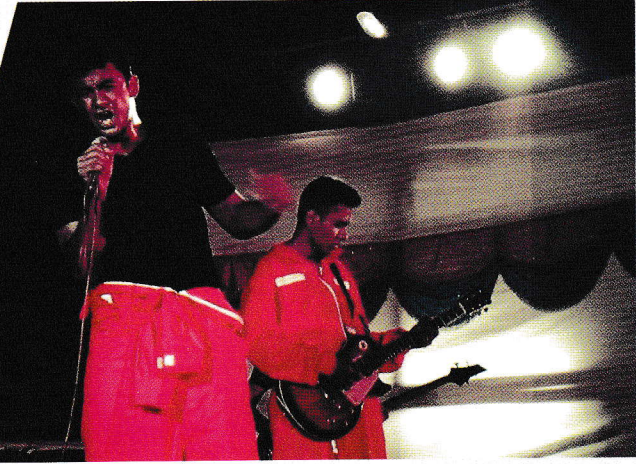
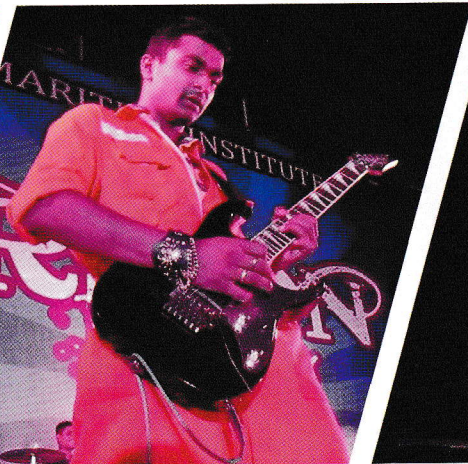
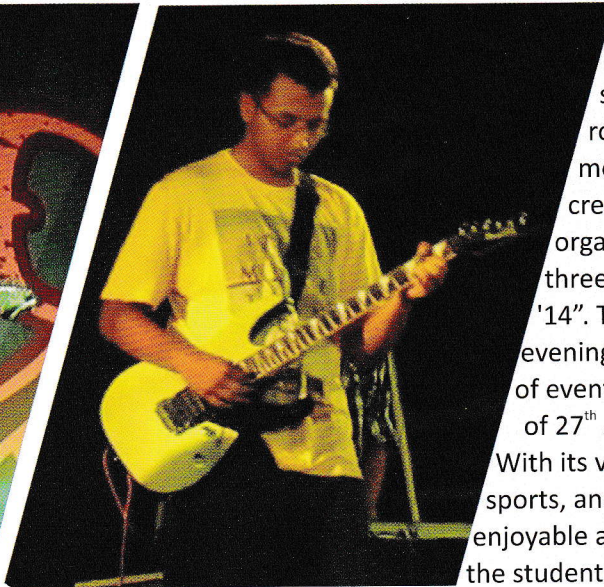
The inaugural lecture was delivered by Efthymios E Mitropoulos, KCMG, Secretary-General Emeritus, International Maritime Organisation London. Mr Mitropoulos spoke on the topic, 'Recent Developments in, and the Future of Shipping'. Dr B K Saxena, Principal, Tolani Maritime Institute, in his welcome address shared his experience of working with Dr C P Srivastava and mentioned him as a teacher and mentor. The welcome address was followed by a video film on Dr. Srivastava as a mark of homage. This video was a fitting tribute to his contribution to Tolani Maritime Institute and the marine industry, in particular.

Gateway Awards

Tolani Maritime Institute was awarded for "Excellence in Maritime Education" for the year 2014, second time in a row by the jury of the Gateway Awards held on the 20th of August, 2014 in Mumbai. 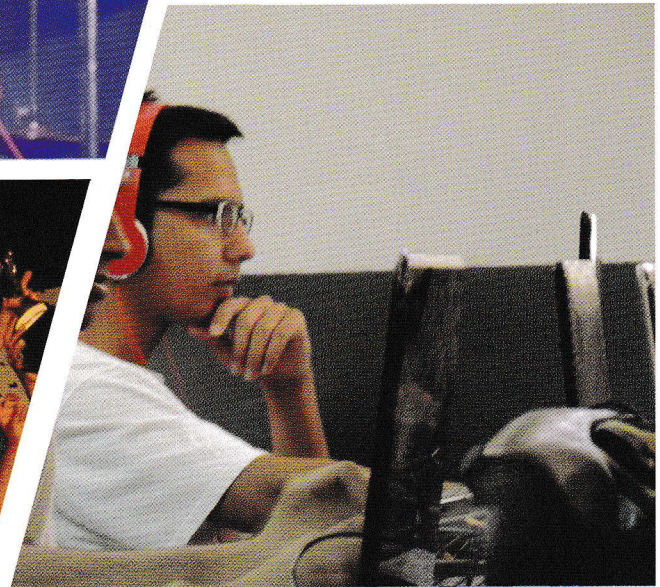
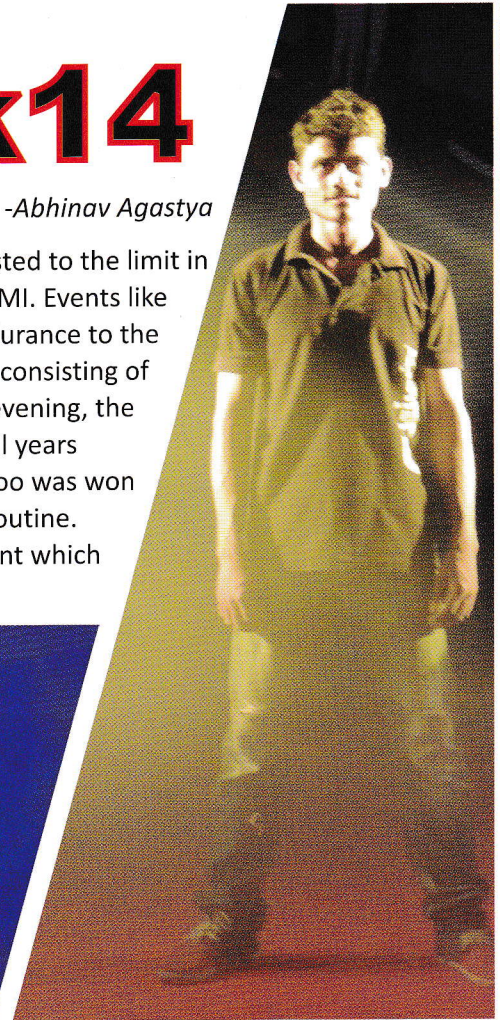

Maritimes was up close with Mr. Anand Laxman Tappu, a man known for his wit and humour. Maritimes tried to explore the subtle world of the man whose life itself has been an ardent example of disciplined duty towards society. We bring to you a few words from the man who has been instrumental in imparting imperative knowledge to the cadets of the institute.



1. How would you describe your childhood and education?

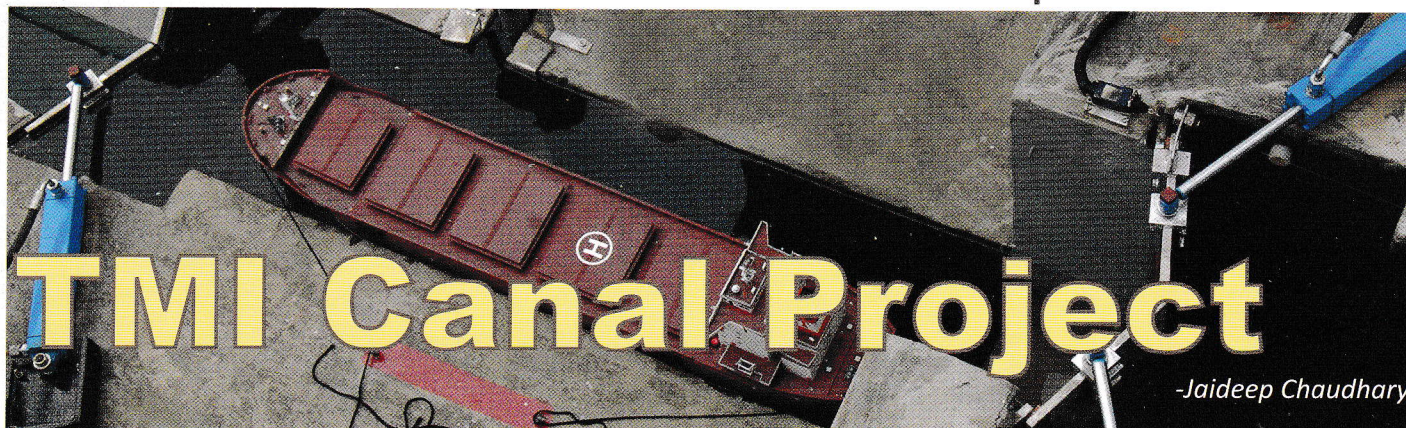
7. Memories from TMI you will always cherish.

"A scientist dreams to make this world better and an engineer makes that dream come true."

This has become true by the TMI Canal Project which is an additional feather in TMI's cap. The project was inaugurated by Erik Graemann (Head of TORM), in the presence of Capt. Ashok Memon, Training Manager, TORM, the faculty and students of TMI on Aug, 19, 2014.

The project has been sponsored by TORM foundation, Denmark, who graciously approved a grant of USD \$21,000 based on the initial project proposed by TMI. TMI took extra initiative by putting paver blocks over 7000 sq ft area and added a lighthouse and rows of flower beds to beautify the area situated next to the ship in campus "Prabhu Vidya". The area now gives a distinctly Nautical look.



The project results is the outcome of the in-house efforts of the students guided by the faculty and the civil engineering department to create three levels of the canal, similar to the system used in the Panama Canal. It uses lock gates which are operated hydraulically, electronic level sensing switches and power back assembly. Three remote controlled model ships, representing a bulk carrier, a tanker and a gas carrier are operated to transit through the canal.

This canal project is a boon to provide a colossal impact in understanding and demonstrating various systems.

Director General Of Shipping visits TMI

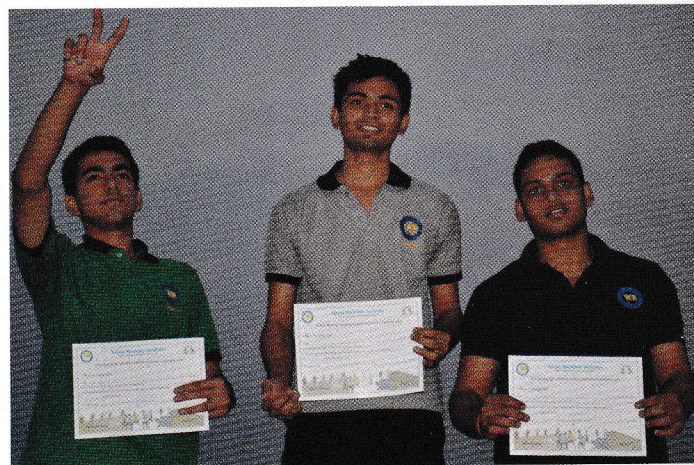
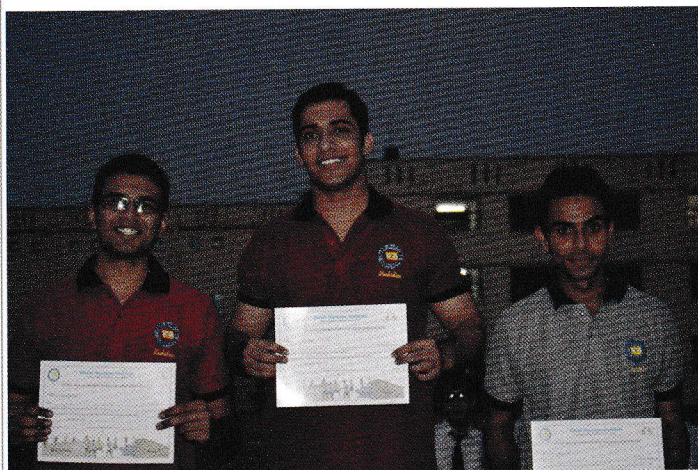
The track events were categorized into two sub events – Short sprints and Long Distance. The star of the short sprint events was Desmond Lopez of Cassim House who won 3 gold medals. Cassim were off to a good start and augmented its lead over the other three houses in the days which followed. Mudaliar was keen on grabbing second place but Morarjee kept the pressure on them because of their successive wins in both 3000m and 5000m long distance running. Anjesh Joshi from Morarjee house stood first in both the events. On the last day, Cassim finished first, Morarjee and Mudaliar, both, stood second with equal points and Master house finished at the bottom. The scenario was no different on the field as Cassim



swept most of the events on the opening day. Javelin throw and Triple jump, both competitions went their way. They stood third in the long jump event. The second day seemed promising as Mudaliar brought out their best to equalize their points with Cassim. The last event of the day, High Jump, was won by Cassim house which meant Mudaliar fell to second place, 2 points adrift of the leaders. At the same time, Morarjee was facing tough competition from Master house for the third spot as both houses fought to maintain their lead over the other in the field events.

1.) Crew Saved from Typhon-Battered Cargo Ship

Fourteen crew members of Chinese cargo ship Hao Jun were airlifted to safety from the sinking vessel by a Hong Kong-based helicopter rescue services. The vessel started taking in water having lost power about 20 kilometers southwest of Macau as the typhoon signal Number 8, dubbed the Kalmaegi, was sweeping through the area.

According to China's Government Flying Services, waves of up to 10 meters bashed the cargo ship, as the crew was readying to abandon the vessel. Extremely difficult wave and wind conditions hampered the rescue operation, which took an hour to complete, the Flying Services said. The crew was reported safe, however it is unknown whether the vessel sank or remained adrift.



2.) BW Orders LNG Carriers



BW Group, a global maritime company involved in oil and gas transportation, floating gas infrastructure, environmental technologies and deepwater production, has signed shipbuilding contracts with Daewoo Shipbuilding and Marine Engineering Co. Ltd. (DSME) for two Liquefied Natural Gas (LNG) carriers plus options for additional vessels on September 17, 2014.

3.) India Ready for LNG Carriers

India's plans to restructure its shipbuilding sector by venturing into construction of more complex ships will see an investment into Cochin yard worth USD 442 million (Rs 1,200 crore).

The investment will be assigned for building a dry-dock for LNG ship construction, according to India's shipping minister Nitin Gadkari.



4.) IMO Kicks Off 67th MEPC Meeting



The Marine Environment Protection Committee (MEPC) of the International Maritime Organization (IMO) is meeting for its 67th session from October 13 to 17, 2014, at IMO Headquarters in London. Items on the agenda include the review of environmental provisions in the draft Polar Code and associated draft MARPOL amendments to make the Code mandatory; the implementation of the Ballast Water Management convention; consideration of proposed amendments to MARPOL; consideration of the 2014 greenhouse gas study update and further work on the implementation of energy-efficiency regulations.
